Introduction

Serving Our Superheroes started life as a project on 13th April 2020, in response to the Covid pandemic, we registered as a charity on 22nd September 2020 and update our constitution to become international on 26th September 2021.

Our first accounting period is up to 30th September 2021. Up to 30th September 2021 we had donated 67,495 items.

At the time of writing this report, 29th May 2022, Serving Our Superheroes has been running for just over 2 years and has donated 164,859 items, with an estimated retail value of over 3 million pounds for the items donated.

These items range from toiletries, washbags filled with toiletries and masks, treat packs, handmade trousers to larger value items such as games consoles, mosses baskets, luxury face creams and makeup, new designer clothes, shoes and hampers and sets. With the smaller donations ranging from £1 to £500 for larger donations, with the average donation of £20 taking the total estimated retail value to £3,297,180.00

This has had a big impact on the lives of so many people both in the UK and internationally.

Although the actual 'cash' received is small, this has been maximised by purchasing items from charity suppliers, such as InKind Direct at a fraction of the retail value and AT amenities are selling us items at cost price, often donating additional stock to us at the same time.

The charity relies mainly on the donations of handmade items from our volunteers who sew and donate the items directly to us.

MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

Serving Our Superheroes provides items to those in need, from hospital, hospice, and care home patients to the homeless and people in the community suffering from hardship, mainly due to poverty (although we do provide emotional dolls for children suffering emotional issues and dementia aids for people living with dementia).

We started back in April 2020, during COVID, providing laundry bags to frontline care workers, (hospitals, hospice, paramedics, and care homes), to prevent the spread of the infection via uniforms. We provided over 2,400 washbags in the space of a few months. By July 2020 most of the local hospitals and care homes had washbags, although we continued with a small amount of laundry bags, we found that the requirements for Foodbanks was increasing, and they needed bags. We then adapted the bag design and started donating re-usable cloth bag to Foodbanks and other charities, that they could fill with items and give to their customers.

We then provided washbags filled with toiletries, for hospital patients and for the homeless.

We also provided PPE – masks, ear guards and scrubs hats to hospitals.

We provided material face masks to the community.

We also supported the homeless and refugees with clothes, blankets, hats, towels, bedding, sleeping bags, shoes/boots, rucksacks etc

We have supported victims of domestic violence who are fleeing their homes.

During COVID we also supplied treat packs to front line key workers.

We have supported schools and families with uniforms, books, toys and emotion dolls, we have given toys and games consoles to hospitals and hospices.

We have provided bespoke care packs, including new-born baby care packs, family essentials for refugees and miscarriage care packs. We have donated many baby items from clothes and nappies to baby furniture, such as cots and mosses baskets.

We provided baby kits for families that had arrived with nothing for their babies. We made custom kits with everything that they needed - these included a bowl that could be used to clean the bottles and wash the baby clothes and doubled as a baby bath. Cold water sterilisers, so that the bottles could be sterilised, nappies, blankets, hat, bottles, bottle, dummy, vest and clothes for the baby.

We have also been providing Fiddle / twiddle muffs – In conjunction with the Rotary club, as part of the Dementia Action Alliance and we have provided over 200 fiddle muffs and 30 memory boxes for people with dementia.

We have provided various hampers; we have provided new-born hampers and luxury make up hampers and we have been providing luxury natural skin care products for hospices.

Since the Covid pandemic we have continued to provide toiletries and sanitary items, to people in the community, including refugees, hospitals/hospices and to the homeless.

We have also made trousers for patients in hospitals and have set up a group called 'Pants for Patients'.

Many patients arrive in hospital with damaged or unsuitable clothing, the basic hospital gowns are open and so it's hard to move around. So that patients aren't stuck in bed, unisex, drawstring trousers can be made and donated to hospitals. Loose adjustable trousers are great for all sizes and are easy to get on and off. These are great for anyone who has been in an accident and had their clothes damages, for elderly patients and for maternity patients - the loose clothing is perfect to wear around the hospital. So far, we have provided over 800 trousers for hospital patients.

In 2021 we started collaborating with dress a girl and we have sent thousands of dresses abroad, in partnership with Dress a Girl around the world, we have sent the dresses that our volunteers have made and the dresses Dress A Girl have provided, from their volunteers all around the world.... So far, we have sent dresses to Syria , Uganda , Zimbabwe , Ghana and now we have dresses going to Cameroon We have also been sending toiletries abroad for the Ukraine refugees as well as supporting the Afghan refugees . We have sent patterns to Rukiga in Uganda and through the Click Rukiga Youth in Development programme they have themselves made hundreds of dresses and they are supporting themselves and learning new skills.



Currently our main offerings are toiletries and trousers (pants for patients).

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS 30 September 2021

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practise applicable to the charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Change in basis of accounting or to previous accounts

There have been no changes to the accounting policies (valuation rules and method of accounting) since last year and no changes have been made to the accounts for previous years.

Fund Accounting
Unrestricted Funds

These are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in

furtherance of the general objects of the charity.

Income Recognition of Income

Income is included in the statement in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity becomes entitled to, and virtually certain to receive, the income and the amount of the income can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies

Voluntary income has received by way of donations and gifts is included in the SoFA when receivable and only when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the income.

Tax reclaims on donations and gifts

Income from tax reclaims in income in the SoFA at the same time as the gift/donation to which it relates.

Donated services and facilities

These are only included in income (with an equivalent amount in expenditure) where the benefits to the Charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material.

Volunteer help The v

The value of any volunteer help received is not included in the accounts.

Expenditure Recognition of expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual's basis. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the

expenditure to which it relates.

Expenditure on charitable activities

These comprise the costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services in the furtherance of its objects, including the

making of grants and governance costs.

audit/independent examination fees, costs linked to the strategic

management of the Charity, together with a share of other

administration costs.

Other expenditure These are support costs not allocated to a particular activity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayment are valued at the amount prepaid net any trade discounts due.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statements of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities. In the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form and integral part of the company's cash management.

Trade and other creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing any trade discounts due.
